Welcome to the Link Trail (55km) joining the Brisbane Valley Rail Trail to the South Burnett Rail Trail for a total distance of 305km. The Link Trail follows the old stock route from Yarraman to Nanango for 21km. Nanango to Kingaroy is a distance of 34km along quiet country backroads. The whole journey can be recognised by the blue and white bicycle signs along the way.

The first part of the route from Yarraman covers beautiful eucalypt (gum) tree country with only the sound of nature to lull your senses. The trail has a rough section of 2km which is marked by signage and cyclists can dismount in areas if unsure. There is one creek crossing which is a dry creek for most of the year.

Once you have arrived at Nanango railway siding, there is a sign telling the visitor of all the accommodation, cafes, restaurants and shops in town. The route then leaves Nanango passing Historic Ringsfield House, the showgrounds and a cycling/pedestrian path to head to Kingaroy.

The countryside changes to a more agricultural flavor with the famous red soil appearance commencing with peanuts, navy beans and grain as well as cattle visible. This is the hilly section of the ride but the views are magnificent. Entry into Kingaroy is past the observatory, the airport and onto the old railway line (now a grassy median strip) leading up to the famous Kingaroy peanut silos and the edge of town where the South Burnett Rail Trail commences.

The activities in the region are numerous ranging from visits to the Bunya Mountains, local wineries, a night time visit to the Kingaroy Observatory, a look at all the arts and craft shops along the route and in the towns, or checking out local history like Ringsfield House, the Kingaroy Museum or Yarraman Heritage Museum. Ask at the Visitor Information Centres in each town, but enjoy the South Burnett and the Link Trail!
